

<p>Michael Koch</p>	<p>I am working as a Post-Doc at the University of Bayreuth. The main research question of my thesis is how globalization shapes the organization of production within firms, with a particular focus on the role of labor market imperfections in open economies. For that reason, I make use of three different models to investigate the interaction between firm organization and labor market imperfections in the process of globalization. Thereby, the organization of production is discussed from different perspectives: (i) the number of products a firm is willing to produce and (ii) the organization of labor within firms. In each chapter, I use a different approach to account for imperfections in factor markets. This allows a broad discussion on how labor market institutions affect the equilibrium outcome in closed and open economies, and how these imperfections affect a firm's organization choice.</p>
